Biographies

Statement of the LWVNYC Board of Directors with respect to changes in the Bylaws

The Bylaws Committee presented their recommendations to the LWVNYC Board of Directors at the Board Meeting on April 19, 2018. The Board of Directors supports all of the changes presented by the Bylaws Committee with one exception. The Bylaws Committee recommends changing Article IV Section 1, which addresses the size and composition of the Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors voted to keep the existing board size and composition. The table below summarizes the differences between the existing Bylaws provision and the Committee proposal:

The existing Board structure offers the following advantages:

- Provides flexibility for the Board to offer leadership opportunities to more members
- Allows the Board to create and fill specific positions that will support LWVNYC going forward and tap into member expertise in areas such as:
 - Development
 - Technology
 - Social Media
- Allows a wide range of views to be heard and debated
- Keeps committee chairs involved in decision making

The Board of Directors recommends keeping the Board at its existing size and composition.

Proposed Amendments to the LWVNYC Bylaws

Recommended by the Bylaws Committee, 2018

Explanation of proposed changes

There are changes in every article and on every page of the Bylaws.

That 8 page document has not been attached here, however, we will have multiple copies of the entire "marked up" Bylaws at the Annual Meeting.

[Bracketed words] indicate proposed deletions. The proposed new language is underlined.

For ease of understanding we have separated the changes into three categories.

- A. The non-substantive: such as referring to the League of Women Voters of the City of New York as the <u>LWVNYC</u>, the <u>League of Women Voters of New York State as LWVNYS</u>, and the <u>League of Women Voters of the United States as LWVUS</u>; renumbering; certain small clarifying changes; and certain punctuation marks.
- B. The changes required by the LWVUS, and the NY Not-for-Profit Corporation

Law.

These include changes in the first three Articles, and the new Article XIII: Statutory Compliance.

C. The substantive changes are as follows:

ARTICLE IV, BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1, Number, Manner of Selection, and Term of Office

- a) The Board of Directors shall consist of the <u>Officers</u> (officers) of the <u>LWVNYC</u>, [six to nine] <u>up to five</u>, <u>but no fewer than three elected Directors and <u>up to four [not more than nine]</u> appointed Directors. The number of elected Directors shall be recommended by the Nominating Committee.</u>
- b) The Officers and elected Directors shall be elected at the Annual Meeting in even-numbered [Elected Board members shall serve for a term of two] years, or at the next Annual Meeting if a vacancy in an elective office has occurred, and shall serve until the next election in an even-numbered year. The Officers and Directors shall appoint such additional Directors as they deem necessary, but not more than four, [nine] to carry on the work of the LWVNYC, [League].
- <u>c)</u> The terms of office of the appointed Directors shall [be one year and shall] expire <u>concurrently</u> with the <u>terms of office of</u> the <u>elected Directors</u>. Officers and Directors, whether elected or appointed, shall be limited to six consecutive years in the same office.

Rationale: Our current bylaws allow a board of up to 25, assuming 2 Co-Presidents. There are two main concerns with a board as large as current bylaws permit.

Scheduling meetings is more complicated, and meetings that can be scheduled are less productive because it is difficult to have a focused discussion.

Individual board members may feel that they cannot participate in a significant manner in a larger board. Smaller boards allow opportunity for greater involvement by individual board members, and better decision-making. The deliberative and collaborative processes of very large boards are not as effective.

Note: Committee Chairs do NOT HAVE to be board members to report at board meetings.

Also, smaller meetings among officers cannot be a substitute for board decision-making.

Section 3, Vacancies <u>and Absences</u>. Any vacancy occurring in the <u>elected Board of Directors</u> by reason of the resignation, death or disqualification of any member may be filled <u>on an interim basis</u>, until the next Annual Meeting, by a majority vote of all the remaining members of the Board of Directors. It shall be the function of the Nominating Committee to recommend to the Board of Directors candidates for vacancies in the elective offices occurring <u>between elections</u>. Absences of any member from three consecutive Board meetings, without valid reason, shall be deemed a resignation.

Section 6, Meetings Members of the Board shall be notified of the time and place of any special <u>meeting</u> by written notice, transmitted by regular mail, fax or e-mail sent at least five (5) business days prior to <u>such meeting.</u> [one week after date of request]

Rationale: Amended to stipulate the method and timing of any special meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

Section 1. Enumeration and Election of Officers. The officers of the [League of Women Voters of the City of New York] LWVNYC shall be a President or two Co-Presidents, or Chair or Co-Chairs or if deemed necessary a management team consisting of however many it is felt necessary to carry out the work of the League (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "President"), up to three Vice Presidents, ordered by number, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The officers shall be elected for terms of two (2) years by the members at the Annual Meeting or until their successors have been elected and qualified. [and take] They take office immediately upon the conclusion of the Annual Meeting.

<u>Section 2. Qualifications. Only voting members of LWVNYC in the State of New York shall be elected or appointed to serve as officers or directors of the LWVNYC.</u>

Rationale: To make consistent with Article III and to specify the qualifications to be an officer or director of LWVNYC.

[ARTICLE VI. BRANCHES

Branches are subdivisions of the League of Women Voters of the City of New York formed to carryout the purposes and policies of LWVUS, LWVNYS and LWVNYC.]

Rationale: There are no branches of the LWVNYC, accordingly, there is no need for this definition.

ARTICLE VII, ANNUAL MEETING - Renumbered

Section 1. There shall be at least one meeting of the membership each year, which shall be designated the Annual Meeting. <u>Notice of the Annual Meeting shall be given to all members at least 30 days prior to the Annual Meeting by fax, email or regular mail.</u>

Rationale: Language has been added to conform to Article VI, Section 4, Article VIII, Section 2, and Article XII, paragraph b.

ARTICLE VIII, NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS - Renumbered

Section 1. Nominating Committee. The immediate Past President of the <u>LWVNYC shall be a member of the Nominating Committee. In the absence of such person, the Board of Directors of the LWVNYC shall select one of its directors to serve in such role. He or she shall select two members of the <u>LWVNYC Board of Directors</u>, to prepare a slate for the elective offices. It shall be one of the functions of the Nominating Committee to recommend to the Board of Directors candidates for vacancies in the elective offices occurring between elections. Suggestions for nominations for officers and directors may be sent to the Nominating Committee by any voting member, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.</u>

Rationale: Language has been clarified, and provides the Nominating Committee with flexibility to select its chair.

ARTICLE X, NATIONAL CONVENTION, [AND] STATE CONVENTION. AND STATE COUNCIL - Renumbered

Section 2. State Council. The <u>Board of Directors [President and/or Co Presidents and/or whomever they designate] shall <u>direct how LWVNYC votes are cast at [be the delegate to]</u> the State Council.</u>

Rationale: Amended to conform to the revised LWVNYS Bylaws provisions regarding the State Council.

ARTICLE XIII. STATUTORY COMPLIANCE ARTICLE

<u>Section 1. Conflicts of Interest Protocols.</u> This Organization shall adopt, and at all times honor, the terms of a written conflicts of interest policy to assure that its Directors, Officers and Key Employees act in the Organization's best interest and comply with applicable legal, regulatory and ethical requirements. The conflicts of interest policy of the Organization shall include, at a minimum, the following provisions:

- a) Procedures. Procedures for disclosing, addressing, and documenting Conflicts of Interest and Related Party Transactions to the Board of Directors, or authorized committee, as appropriate.
- b) Restrictions. Stipulations that when the Board of Directors, or authorized committee, as appropriate, is considering a real/potential conflict of interest, the interested party shall not:
 - i. be present at, or participate in, any deliberations,
 - ii. attempt to influence deliberations, and/or
 - iii. cast a vote on the matter.
- <u>c)</u> <u>Definitions.</u> <u>Definitions of circumstances that could constitute a conflict of interest.</u>
- d) Documentation. Requirements that the existence and resolution of the conflict be documented in the records of the Organization, including in the minutes of any meeting at which the conflict was discussed or voted upon.
- e) Audit-Related Disclosure. Protocols to assure for the disclosures of all real or potential conflicts of interest are properly forwarded to the Audit Committee or Conflicts of Interest Committee, as appropriate, or if there is no such Audit or Conflicts Committee, to the Board of Directors, or another Committee of the Board, as appropriate.

Rationale: This provision must be included in the Bylaws under the current provisions of the NY Not-For-Profit Corporation Law.

LWVNYC Impact on Issues

City Budget

- Advocate reducing expenditures by minimizing waste and duplication in city spending, increasing productivity and better management.
- Advocate increasing revenues by: implementing tax abatement programs for business with emphasis on rehabilitation, job creation and retention; adjusting business occupancy tax to lessen the burden on small businesses; utilizing a reasonable commuter tax; revising sales tax to lessen the burden on people with low incomes; asking for additional payments in lieu of taxes for property owned by authorities, State and Federal governments; eliminating additional classes of property from tax exemption regulations.

City Employees

Oppose city residency as a requirement for civil service employment in city government

Criminal Justice

- Support the use of integrated statewide computer data banks throughout the criminal justice system to assure efficiency of operation while safeguarding privacy and confidentiality rights of citizens.
- Support decentralization of juvenile detention facilities as a more effective and humane method of treating juvenile offenders.
- Support of alternatives to incarceration and measures to promote a fair and efficient jury system.

Economic Development

- Support programs and policies that would assure that Public Authorities be representative, accountable and subject to open government laws and regulations
- Support Business Improvement Districts (BIDS) when a majority of local business owners
 determine that a BID can provide supplemental services and job opportunities which cannot
 be provided with city resources. BIDs should be held accountable to and audited by
 appropriate city government agencies, required to hold annual meetings for their company
 and required to submit to public hearings and ballot approval before BID contracts are
 renewed by the city. At least 51% of the BID members must approve the renewal.
- Support commercial rent regulation that will provide a reasonable solution to the problem of steadily rising commercial rents. The League supports commercial rent legislation which promotes economic opportunity and development, sets forth criteria for the determination of reasonable rent increases and negotiation of lease terms, and is fair to both the landlord and the commercial tenant.

Education

- Advocate quality public education in New York with emphasis on assuring that education funds support classroom services.
- Support inclusion of the responsibilities of the Department of Education in the City Charter.
- Support Mayoral Control of the public schools;
- Supports fixed terms for members of the Panel for Educational Policy who are appointed by the Mayor, the Borough Presidents and the Public Advocate.
- Support quality early childhood education, Head Start and universal pre-kindergarten.

Election Law

- Support public financing of campaigns; a voluntary program of public matching funds for small donations
- Support comprehensive campaign finance reform and establishment of an independent, rigorous enforcement regime to ensure compliance
- Support full disclosure of campaign contributions and expenditures
- Oppose term limits for elected city officials.

- Support continuation of run-off elections for Mayor, Comptroller and Public Advocate, which
 may be achieved through Instant Runoff Voting.
- Support a Board of Elections of 10 Commissioners -- two from each borough representing the two major parties with Board activities administered by a single Director.
- Support mandatory training for inspectors, recruitment of bilingual inspectors and appropriate compensation for inspectors.
- Support increased instruction on the use of voting machines, including demonstrations at the polls; increased publication of polling places, dates and times of registration.
- Support the implementation of voting systems and procedures which are secure, accurate, recountable, and endorse a precinct-based paper ballot optical scan voting system with a ballot marker to provide accessibility.
- Support publication of sample ballots on the Board of Elections website to be accessible through the poll site locator.
- Support elimination of the LLC (limited liability corporation) loophole which allows these LLCs
 to contribute to candidates as individuals rather than as corporations, which enables them to
 give larger and multiple contributions.

Housing

- Support government policies which assure an adequate supply of decent affordable housing, including the continuation of rent regulation, adequate financing for public housing, and provisions that guarantee that affordable housing provided in return for tax abatements to private owners remain permanently affordable.
- Support guaranteed inclusionary zoning; utilizing neighborhood median income rather than the federally defined area median income (AMI).
- Support increased density, provided that the developments are limited to locations where
 there is adequate infrastructure, subway and bus service, schools and parks to support the
 development.
- Support a citywide inventory of vacant land and buildings.

Natural Resources

- Energy Support environmentally sound policies that reduce energy growth rates, emphasize energy conservation and encourage the use of renewable energy resources while supplying a reliable and safe energy supply
- Water resources Support measures to improve and protect NYC surface water, groundwater and drinking water.
- Air Quality Support and promote measures to improve New York City's air quality: encourage energy and waste reduction, and adoption of renewable energy sources.
- Support working with other advocacy groups, City officials and members of the City Council
 to pass specific bills that help improve New York City's air and water for the health of those
 who work, visit and live in New York City.

Transportation

Support action to promote energy-efficient and environmentally sound transportation systems
that improve the well-being of cities and other communities and afford better access to
housing and jobs.

Statement on Local Program Recommendation from Membership

A member offered the following recommendation for a LWVNYC Local Program: "Investigation of human trafficking (both labor and sexual, male and female) in NYC. Extent, what is being done to eradicate, what needs to be done."

The LWVNYC Board offered the following recommendation:

The breadth and depth of the topic, even at the NYC level, will require considerable resources and effort to tackle. As an interim step, the Program Committee is planning to schedule a speaker for either a lunch or evening event in the fall, 2018. This autumn event could stimulate interest from membership to provide research support and focus for this project. The Board therefore voted not to recommend this topic as part of the 2018 LWVNYC Impact on Issues Program.
