What is Ranked Choice Voting?

In 2019, voters in
New York City came
together to pass a new
way to vote called
Ranked Choice Voting
(RCV). RCV allows voters
to rank up to five
candidates, instead
of choosing only
one candidate.

When do we use RCV?

NYC Primary Elections are held to vote for Mayor, Public Advocate, Comptroller, City Council Members and Borough Presidents. You can only vote in a Primary Election if you are registered with a political party holding a primary to choose their candidate for the General Election ballot.

NYC Special Elections are held if an elected official leaves office before the end of their term, and are open to any registered voter regardless of party.

It is **not used** for District Attorneys. Though responsible for each borough, they are State officials.

Why do we use RCV?

- It encourages candidates to connect with more voters who might rank them in their top five.
- It **saves public money** (your money!) by not having a runoff election if no candidate wins more than 50% of all votes.
- It gives voters more say because they have multiple choices.

How do you fill out your ballot?

Ballots can have more than five candidates but you can rank only up to five.

CORRECT BALLOT


You can vote for only one candidate **OR** you can rank up to five.

Don't rank more than five even if there are more than five candidates.

INCORRECT BALLOT

Your ballot won't count if you:




How does Ranked Choice Voting work?

To win the election, a candidate must receive more than 50% of the votes.

FIRST ROUND

All votes are counted and either:




One candidate receives more than 50% of the total votes.




No candidate receives more than 50% of the total votes, so a second round begins.

SECOND ROUND




The candidate with the fewest votes in round one is eliminated. If a voter's first choice was eliminated, then their second choice is counted. If no candidate gets 50%, a third round begins.

THIRD ROUND



The candidate with the fewest votes in round two is eliminated. If a voter's second choice was eliminated then their third ranked vote is counted.

FINAL ROUND



This process continues until one candidate receives **more than 50%** of the votes and wins!
