




## 2025 Impact Report

### 2025 BY THE NUMBERS

- 150,000+ New Yorkers reached
- 800+ volunteers powering NYC democracy
- 1,800 hours of civic service
- 175 partner organizations strengthening civic knowledge
- 35 interns supporting nonpartisan voter education
- 107,000 people accessed ballot proposal information
- 4,100 New Yorkers joined our online community
- 3,400 personalized Get-Out-The-Vote postcards delivered to low-turnout districts
- 225 in-person outreach events held across the five boroughs
- 14,000 conversations sparked on Constitution Day
- 5,100 people viewed the Constitution Conversation with Heidi Schreck and Ally Coll
- 62 Speakers Bureau civics presentations in schools and community spaces

The League of Women Voters of the City of New York delivered civic and crucially important nonpartisan election information to 150,000 New Yorkers in 2025.

Our grass roots, on-the-ground outreach sparked conversations throughout the five boroughs, focusing on low-voter turnout districts. Through two NYC elections, our volunteers were everywhere, handing out Civic Explainers in multiple languages, explaining the importance of local elections and Ranked Choice Voting. We take pride that NYC's voter turnout increased greatly in 2025.



For this fall's Constitution Day, we handed out over 14,000 copies of the US Constitution to New Yorkers, and hosted Heidi Schreck, acclaimed playwright of "What the Constitution Means to Me," together with Ally Coll, Associate Professor, CUNY School of Law, for a "Constitution Conversation" with students. A recording of the event is now available for schools and community groups to host their own Constitution Conversations.



Our Spring fund-raiser featured Shaina Taub of "Suffs" — award-winning playwright, composer, and actor using her talents to show-

case the struggles for suffrage. We also honored Amalgamated Bank, Citizen Travelers, and the Delta Sorority for their dedication to civic engagement.



In October, our corporate event at EY featured Kathryn Wylde, CEO Partnership for NYC and Julie Samuels, CEO Tech:NYC. Their conversation focused on public-private partnerships as the future of NYC's success.
